

onel and Lenuta look wise beyond their years and perhaps they are. Thus far their young lives have been incredibly hard. Their mother died of alcohol abuse. Their father is away from home, working in Russia to support his three children. Their brother is disabled. And their grandfather – their only day-to-day carer – is a very old man.

Standing in the winter sunshine, on the dirt track of their home village in eastern Moldova, they have a solemn dignity all their own. The gifts they received from Blythswood's Shoe Box Appeal made them very happy, according to Dumitru Sevastian. "They were very thankful," he says.

Last winter Blythswood's Shoe Box Appeal resulted in 106,000 shoeboxes being delivered to people in eight east European countries and in Pakistan.

Filled with everyday items such as a bar of soap, a pair of socks and a notebook, boxes from the annual appeal bring practical aid to people deprived of basic necessities.

But more than that they bring the message that somebody cares. Whatever their futures hold, Ionel and Lenuta enjoyed the kindness of strangers that day. Their lives were brightened, their horizons broadened.

Klara* is raising seven children on her own. Her husband died several years ago and the father of her younger children gives her no support.

Twice a year the family receives assistance from Romanian charity Fundația Creștină Elim, which before Christmas distributed Blythswood shoeboxes in Bihor country, northwest Romania.

"I don't know how Klara manages," says FCE worker Lidia Micula. "The allowance for each child is worth less than £15 per month and the social support she receives for herself is just £30. It is very obvious that without the kindness of the people who filled the shoeboxes, these children would have no gifts for

'YOUR GIFTS HELP RESTORE DIGNITY

Neda's home village on the banks of the Danube in eastern Serbia is a popular destination for tourists who like fishing but life there is not so comfortable for some of its poorer residents.

The rented house in which the seven-year-old girl lives with her mother and two sisters lacks running water and is in poor condition. Her mum is unemployed and without anyone to help her raise her family.

For families like these, giftfilled boxes from Blythswood's Shoe Box Appeal are a special encouragement, according to Pastor Dragisa Armus who distributed boxes throughout Serbia in December.

"Your gifts help restore their dignity," he says. "The girls were especially happy to find new clothes in their boxes. People of all ages feel touched to receive a gift. They realise that they are not forgotten and their hope for life is renewed."



SHOEBOXES REACH UKRAINE

Maryan is seven years old. He lives in western Ukraine. Even by the standards of his country, his family is poor and they have no means of celebrating Christmas. So it was a total surprise for the boy to receive a box full of gifts, especially a toy car. And given the winter temperatures, the gloves and hat were sure to come in handy too. Despite troubles in the region, Blythswood managed to deliver 7,500 shoeboxes to a Ukrainian partner organisation in 2014.

Hungarian charity Good News Foundation has been working with Blythswood Care for 18 years. Last winter they distributed 5,000 Blythswood shoeboxes to adults as well as children, with many going to elderly people and to those with disabilities.

Robi is 35 and lives in a care home in the town of Baja, in southern Hungary. Lilla Ficsor has visited the home many

times and says that although he has difficulty in speaking and has learning disabilities, Robi has a warm and affectionate personality. "He likes outings and listening to Bible stories," she says. "When we were there, Robi and his friends put on a simple play, acting out the story of Jesus healing the ten lepers.

"He was very glad to receive his Christmas presents."



ight-year-old Huma regarded her box as being not for herself alone but for her entire family. Soft toys and a pink blanket for her baby sister. Soap for her dad. Toys and hairbands for herself. And a toothbrush and paste to be shared by everyone.

Her parents are farm workers in northeast Pakistan and between them earn little more than £6 per day. Huma's desire is to go to school – she would love to learn to read and write.

Geza* was resident on a rehabilitation course for alcoholics when Blythswood shoeboxes were distributed last December. And this experience of unexpected kindness marked a turning point in his attitude towards others.

His time at Bonus Pastor Foundation's Therapy Centre in the Transylvanian village of Ozd was his third attempt at addressing the problem which threatened to destroy his life. Twice he had attended a short-term programme but had relapsed after going home.

"His alcoholism narrowed down his perspective on life," says BPF team member Eva Adorjan. "Although he is married and has an eight-year-old son, the joy of giving had disappeared from his life. He no longer understood what it meant to give or receive a present.

"When he received a box full of gifts he was so surprised. It made a big impact in him. It made him think of giving to others and especially of giving himself back to his wife and son. On his next visit home, his wife noticed the difference in his kindness towards her and towards their son.

"Since completing the course at Ozd, he frequently tells us how his life has changed. Now he has a job and his relationship with his family has healed."

Surprised by kindness – shoebox brings tears and smiles

hide his tears. In all his 67 years, he didn't know if he had ever received such a valuable gift.

Such an emotional reaction to receiving a Blythswood shoebox is not unusual, especially amongst older people who can be more easily moved by an unexpected act of kindness. Istvan, who lives in a small town in northeast Hungary, has suffered many hard knocks in life – his wife left him, he was prevented from seeing their three children, and he turned to drink.

Three years ago he rediscovered the

Christian faith in which he had been brought up but his path to sobriety has been rocky with many relapses. In this situation the gift of a shoebox brought him joy and an awareness of being loved.

"He was smiling like a child," says shoebox distributor Gabi Geczi. "The box was filled with things he really needed, like a hat, socks, and a toothbrush. The booklet in the Hungarian language touched his very being.

"This Christmas present showed him there is someone who still cares for him."



Pencils, crayons and colouring books can open a new world to children like Anka

Anka enters a world of colour

When three-year-old Anka opened her Blythswood shoebox she entered a new world of colour. She loved her My Little Pony set which included pencils and rubbers and was soon engrossed in using her new crayons on a colouring book.

For the children who gathered in a village hall in Sliven province, Bulgaria, the gift-filled boxes are a treat they could not have imagined. Anka comes from a family of four living in a single-roomed dwelling which had suffered flooding earlier in the winter. Her father's employment in construction is seasonal, leaving the family dependent on state provision of about £80 per month.

"Anka was really taken with everything in her box," says Danny Muschate, Blythswood's head of fundraising who helped distribute boxes in December. "She discovered hair slides and put them in all by herself.

"Your gifts mean so much to families like these, whose day-to-day standard of living is incredibly basic."

ina was one of eighty homeless people in Chisinau, Moldova, who received Blythswood shoeboxes last year. The hats and scarves were immediately useful to them on the streets of Moldova's capital city where average low temperatures in the month of December are minus 4C.

And Zina and her companions were glad of the food, too, which Blythswood's partners bring them once a week throughout the winter.

For 25 years Zina worked as a nurse in a hospital. But when she lost her job, her life fell apart. She started drinking and soon became homeless. Dumitru Sevastian is one of those who deliver boxes and aid funded by Blythswood Care. He says: "Zina was surprised that someone cared about her when even her own relatives had abandoned her."

Lili knows a treat when she sees one

Sweets are treats for low-income families

What makes a four-year-old happy? How about some sweeties? For Lili who comes from a big, low-income family, the Giant Strawbs promised to be a real treat.

ADRA distributed Blythswood shoeboxes to children in residential care and to low-income families at social centres around Hungary. ADRA team member Eva Hella says: "Some families such as Lili's live in very poor conditions. Your gifts bring much happiness."



GIFTS FOR CHILDREN WHO FLED VIOLENCE AT HOME

For five-year-old Marci* the children's home in Hungary where he lives is a place of safety. He and his two siblings were given refuge there after they fled from violent mistreatment at the hands of their parents.

When a team from Budapest-based charity ADRA arrived with Blythswood boxes it was a special day for the children. "Marci was very happy with everything he received," says Eva Hella. "We would like to thank everyone who made it possible to provide the children with these gifts."




Ten year old Daniela and her younger sister Rebecca are used to a hard life. Their parents don't have permanent jobs but take casual work whenever they can. Sometimes the family goes hungry. Sometimes they are cold because there is no firewood for the stove. But the girls know they won't be emptyhanded at Christmas because year after year they have each received a box of precious gifts from Blythswood's Shoe

Box Appeal. For children like these, items of warm clothing are especially important.

"The parents are ashamed of their poverty but they hope for a better future for their children," says Balazs Csiszer, who delivered boxes to families around the city of Cluj. "The girls are really motivated to go to school and get an education so that they can overcome their family's difficulties."
