"Dani's attendance is very good," says Carmen Popa who teaches at Talita Kum, in Jimbolia, western Romania. "He's been with us four years and has now joined TK2, the programme for junior secondary pupils.

"He does okay at school but still needs the extra tuition we can give. He prefers maths to Romanian. Once he grasps an idea he insists on working independently and finishes all his homework.

"He enjoys everything the programme has to offer – food, games, activities. He loves acrobatics and is always trying to improve his front and back flips.

"In February he joined us on a skiing trip. It was his second time. His skiing is improving nicely and it gives him so much confidence. Without your support for Talita Kum, children like Dani would never get this opportunity."


Learning for life – Romania Gift code R2

Sewing skills enable abandoned mum to support her children

Sewing skills -**Zimbabwe Gift code DA4**

A 36-year-old mother in Harare, Zimbabwe, is able once more to support her two children thanks to training in sewing skills, supported through Blythswood's gift catalogue.

Yeukai has been educationally disadvantaged since she was a child. Her father who was polygamous struggled to pay for her schooling. Although she got as far as sitting O levels, she could never collect the results as her school fees remained unpaid.

Pressured into marriage before she was ready for it, Yeukai found herself alone with two children when her husband abandoned her and went to South Africa.

She went to stay with an uncle in Harare while her parents-in-law took custody of the children. It was there that she learned of the sewing skills programme run by Streams of Hope and supported by Blythswood Care.

"Yeukai is truly a hard worker whom we all admire," says Streams of Hope director Stephen Damuputirai. "She raised capital from the garments she made while training in 2018 and managed to buy an industrial sewing machine.

"Now she is able to pay her rent and support her family." "I want to thank Blythswood for changing my life," Yeukai says. "I no longer need to beg for help for my children."

Believing in young people - Romania Gift code R1

A young man who dropped out of Blythswood Care's **Daniel Centre programme** after just six months decided to come back in January. And now he is learning to hold down his first proper job.

"I came back because I wanted to work," Istvan says. To do that, he recognised that he needed the support which the Daniel Centre offers to young people leaving Romania's care system.

Daniel Centre social worker Dani Ciupe had kept in touch with Istvan through Facebook after he left. "I accepted him as a friend." Dani savs. "I told him he could come back." Dani explains how young people in the care of the state have money put aside for them, to which they are given access after they turn 18. "Istvan though that because he had €2,000 he didn't need to work. It happens with everyone in his situation. They don't realise how hard it is to make money."

When Istvan returned in January, Dani helped him to get a job in a supermarket. "I went with him to the interview." he says. "It was hard because the manager had previous experience of young men in his position not staying."

Now Dani takes time each day to talk with Istvan before he goes to work and when he comes back. "He is quite shy," he says. "I encourage him to ask questions and to learn." In his new role, Istvan serves customers face to face, slicing

meat to their requirements. He has received training from his new employer and says he likes his job.

The Daniel Centre programme encourages the young people to maintain contact with family. Istvan never knew his father and his mother died two years ago, but he does keep in touch with his step brothers in his home village, 100km from Cluj.

The Daniel Centre is currently home to seven young men who lack the support that people at

their stage of life normally receive from birth families.

A further seven who have achieved independence are helped with low-rent tenancies and know they are welcome to drop in for encouragement and advice.

Feed a family - UK Gift code UK2

Your gifts to Blythswood's Highland Foodbank enabled a retail worker on a zero-hours contract to survive a post-Christmas collapse in her wages.

"Up until Christmas Wilma* was working 40 hours a week," says Highland Foodbank manager Lorna Dempster.
"But she had very few shifts in January and had to apply for Universal Credit.

"The week in which she was referred to us by Citizens' Advice Bureau she had worked only four hours and had no prospect of more.

"She had spent her savings on rent and bills and would have to wait another two weeks for her first payment of Universal Credit. She was so grateful for the help Foodbank gave her and told one of our volunteers that she didn't know what she would have done without it.

"Wilma is single and has no family living in the area. Friends had invited her to pop round for meals but she felt there were only so many times she could do that."

In 2019 your gifts helped Highland Foodbank to provide a three-day food supply to 7,724 people, preventing them from going hungry during personal financial crises.

Your gifts provide mosquito nets, making a rapid difference to the health of people like Marthaline

The wife of a poor rice farmer in rural Liberia is expecting their first child. And she believes the improvement in her health which made her pregnancy possible is due to sleeping under a mosquito net provided by Blythswood Care.

"This could not have happened while I was having malaria seizures," Marthaline says.
"I used to have fevers twice a month and was very anaemic.
"My husband James used to walk with me a long way into the remote forest to visit the witch doctor. The doctor boiled bitter roots and herbs in creek

water but I never felt any better. James paid a lot of money for my treatment but I was frightened because many people going through this treatment died.

"My neighbour suggested we come down to Monrovia for treatment. We stayed with her sister who is an evangelist with the Watch & Pray Mission in Gardnersville. There James and I slept in a bed with a brand new treated mosquito net. It was the first time we had seen one.

"The community clinic confirmed we were suffering from malaria and began

treatment. On the third week, when we returned to our home in Gbarnga the Mission gave us two sets of long-life insecticide-treated mosquito nets and taught us how we must use them.

"Now we all sleep under nets and my family life has changed for the better as I am now pregnant."

And that wasn't the only change the couple experienced as a result of their time at the Mission. "We heard the call of Christ and responded," Marthaline says. "We are now living in the joy of Christian faith in Gbarnga."

Summer camp for Ana is a week full of fun, friends and feeling secure. And your gifts for children's camps meant that the 10-vear-old was able to return for the second time last summer.

Ana lives with her grandmother in Marghita, northwest Romania – an arrangement made to ensure that she actually attends school. It's in Ana's best interests as her parents seem unaware of the importance of education. But it means that during the school term she is separated from her younger sisters.

"Ana said her sisters would love to be at camp too, but they are too small," says Lidia Micula, a teacher with Blythswood's partner organisation Fundatia Crestina Elim. "She had a great time playing and enioving herself with no worries or anxieties."

Activities at Ana's camp included swimming, team games, arts and crafts, and Bible stories.

In 2019, nearly 4,000 young people attended Christian summer camps in Eastern Europe, supported by Blythswood Care. Blythswood's partner organisations in Pakistan provided activities and special events for thousands more.

Balanced diet restores health to fatherless boy

Mahender is a chubby, healthy twelve-vear-old lad whose favourite game is kabaddi, the vigorous contact sport popular throughout the Indian subcontinent.

But two years ago his situation was very different. His father had died, following years of alcohol abuse. leaving his young family in extreme poverty.

It was an uncle who approached Dayspring House, near Hyderabad, seeking admission for the malnourished boy, who was dressed in rags.

"Since coming to Dayspring, his health has improved," says Pastor Samuel Babu who oversees the welfare and education of 35 children with support from Blythswood Care.

Meals at Dayspring are based on a traditional Indian diet of rice, pulses and vegetables with milk, eggs, chicken and fruit to make sure the children receive the protein and vitamins they need.

"Mahender is gaining weight and doing well at school," Samuel Babu says. "His ambition is to become a doctor"

CLEAN WATER TRANSFORMS LIVES IN LIBERIA

Care with clean water -Africa Gift code OH6



In March 2018, Ophelia lost two of her grandchildren. They died of cholera and diarrhoea as a result of drinking dirty water.

January to May is the dry season in Liberia and clean water is a scarcity in Monrovia, the nation's capital with a population of 1.5 million people.

Ophelia had filled her empty plastic containers at a well five miles from home. She saw there were dead rats in the water but still believed it to be less dangerous than the St Paul River which is full of untreated sewage.

"It was the saddest time in my life." she remembers. "We were all suffering from stomach cramps and illness and many people died."

Christian radio helps young listeners make good life choices.

When Jackson Nkeshimana was a law student in Bujumbura, he used to carry a radio with him wherever he went. The reason? He loved listening to the Radio lvyizigiro, a Christian radio station supported by Blythswood Care.

"I liked it so much that I applied to volunteer as a presenter and journalist," he says. "After two years they offered me a full time contract."

The offer from the radio station came at the same time as a

job offer from the government in Burundi, who were taking on newly qualified law graduates.

Despite a much lower salary, Jackson saw this opportunity in Christian radio as an answer to his prayers and took it gladly. "My dream was to evangelise as many people as possible," he says. At Radio lvyizigiro he has been able to preach from the Bible in his native Kiswahili language, reaching hundreds of thousands of listeners throughout Burundi and neighbouring countries in Africa's Great Lakes region.

Jackson has now worked as a full time presenter for 13 years, and also pastors a congregation of 300 people in Bujumbura. His radio messages for young people have led to him being invited to speak at youth conferences.

Lewis Niyokwizera was a listener to Jackson's programmes and says they changed his life. The young film producer was tempted to adopt a sexually promiscuous lifestyle, although he knew this was not right for a Christian. "One day Jackson's broadcast was on how to choose the one to marry," he says. "His message put me on the right road and now I am about to get married."

Sumaira knows the value of education as only someone who missed out can.
Coming from a poor family she was not allowed to proceed beyond grade five in the primary school.
Her family needed her to work at home.

Even attendance at church was a rare treat. But when she did get there, maybe once a month, she really enjoyed it. "I felt calm and joyous," she savs. "It was indescribable.

"Whenever I was able to attend youth programmes at church,

I thought how blessed these children were, to be getting a Christian education from childhood.

"As a child I had never been given the opportunity to attend Sunday School. But one day at church I met a Sunday School teacher who told me about Pakistan Sunday School Ministry and their training programme for children's workers.

"God answered my prayers and I was able to complete two days of training in Gujranwala. Now by God's grace I am able to run a Sunday School in a village nearby. As many as 85 children from several villages gather in the church and I teach them Bible stories, helped by the materials provided by PSSM.

"I thank God for giving me this opportunity to fulfil my calling."





Supporting Evangelism in Serbia

Maintain a ministry – Eastern Europe Gift code PS1

A pastor supported by Blythswood Care has returned to his native northern Serbia to minister to a congregation of just seven members.

But he goes with a mission to share the gospel with the whole community in what is one of the least evangelised corners of Europe.

Jovica Gecan was 16 years old before he held a copy of the New Testament in his hands for the first time. "I went to a home bible study with a cousin," he says. "Some time after that I went to an evangelistic meeting in Novi Sad. Billy Graham was on the big screen and his message hit me. When he called for people to come forward, I crossed the theatre in front of everybody and prayed for the first time in my life."

Jovica's conversion seemed to be short-lived. "When I was left alone I went back to my old life," he admits. "But the Lord found me again as a married man in 2001. My wife Katherine and I agreed it's the Lord's way or no way.

"We were baptised in 2003 and went to Bible College a year later."

For the last six years Jovica has been attending a bean festival in Kraljevo, seeing it as an opportunity to distribute Christian books and to engage with people. "When the beans are cooked, we prepare tables and invite people to come and have lunch with us. This gives the opportunity for one-to-one conversation. We are well known for our 100 litre cauldron but people ask why we are doing this. We turn everything round to the subject of the Lord and His grace."

The small church in Ruski

create a meeting room and
catering facilities, allowing them
to help the poorest in the
community. Jovica also attends
bikers' rallies, speaking to
people about the gospel.
He says: "Our vision is for
people to know and turn to God."
